ECO1	Theoretical and computational aspects of the Black-Scholes equation		This course meets the expectations of the Graduate Program in Economics at Federal University of Juiz de Fora (PPGE/UFJF), in order to attract foreign students to the M.Sc. and/or Ph.D.'s Programs in Economics, as well as to allow a greater integration with students from courses of the areas of social sciences and exact sciences.  The course offered is in line with the Asset Pricing discipline offered at PPGE/UFJF, which is part of applied finance, one of the areas of action within the PPGE's microeconomics applied research line. It will also serve to attract to the PPGE students of other areas of social sciences, such as business administration and accounting sciences as well as students from the exact area, among which we could highlight: mathematics, statistics, physics, computer science and engineering.  Program: 1. A brief introduction to stochastics process: from Brownian motion to Itô's lemma; 2. The Black-Scholes partial differential equation; 3. A closed-form solution to the Black-Scholes partial differential equation, through the heat equation: the Black-Scholes formulae; 4. Extensions of the Black-Scholes formulae; 5. Hedging portfolios: the Greeks; 6. Computational implementations in Python and in an Android app to calculate option prices (based in the Black-Scholes type formulas) and the Greeks (to hedging purposes); 7. A brief discussion on the limitations of the Black-Scholes formula (such as volatility smile among others) and further extensions to more precise models to predict option pricing. LIT2	Classical reception in Brazilian modern literature	<p>When 8-12am, Fri, 21 &amp; 28 July Where Sciences Center, Auditorium 1</p> <p><b>Brief description</b> This course aims at addressing some of the most important commonalities between four representative works of Brazilian modern literature and their classical leitmotive, focusing on solutions found by Brazilian authors to culturally contextualize their version of Greek and Roman narratives in contemporary times. Such a procedure shall draw attention to particular literary effects, leading us to theoretical questions on inter, archi, hyper, or simply transtextuality (as defined by Genette in 1982: "all that sets the text in a relationship, whether obvious or concealed, with other texts"). The following titles will be object of analysis and discussion: Plautus' Aulularia (The Pot's Comedy) in O santo e a porca (The saint and the sow, 1957) by Ariano Suassuna (1927-2014); Eurípides' Medea in Gota d'água: uma tragédia brasileira (The final straw: a Brazilian tragedy, 1975) by Paulo Pontes and Chico Buarque de Hollanda; Homer's Odyssey (Book 17) in Amor (Love, 1960), a short story by Clarice Lispector (1920-1977) and Linda, uma história horrível (Beauty, a terrible story, 1988), a tale by Caio Fernando Abreu (1948-1996)</p>

LIT4	<p>Literatura y pensamiento latinoamericanos: las formas de lo regional en Gilberto Freyre y José Carlos Mariátegui</p> <p><b>Brief description</b></p> <p>El curso pretende ampliar el conocimiento sobre las formas de surgimiento y comprensión de una nueva conciencia regional en los comienzos del siglo XX a partir de una mirada intercultural y comparatista. En el decorrer de los últimos años de la década del 20 y en los años 30, intelectuales como Gilberto Freyre, en Brasil, y José Carlos Mariátegui, en Perú, se entregaron a la tarea de repensar los signos de la transformación experimentada en sus países, propiciando la construcción de un pensamiento que hacía una puesta en crisis de conceptos como los de identidad nacional, raza y tradición y con esto proponían también nuevos caminos para reflexionar sobre las posibilidades de un arte nuevo y los sentidos positivos de la imaginación literaria. Ambos intelectuales, por trayectorias e ideologías bien diferentes, escribían especialmente conectados con el horizonte de la época: la acelerada mundialización de la economía capitalista en su nuevo ciclo de entreguerras y las demandas internacionalistas, la crisis y restrukturación del Estado nacional moderno y la conocida crisis de las democracias liberales. Freyre y Mariátegui operacionalizaron, en su vasta producción de artículos, ensayos y libros, así como de eventos culturales, una profunda metamorfosis del concepto de lo regional. Asimismo, pretendese iluminar, en este curso, cómo esa nueva conciencia regional dialoga con una nueva región estética, dentro del campo literario latinoamericano, que busca capturar las demandas de compromiso político con las localidades culturales, los sujetos en su diversidade cultural y sus tradiciones. LIT8	Marguerite Duras et l'écriture de l'intime	<p>When 8am-12pm, Tue &amp; Thu, 4 &amp; 6 July Where Sciences Center, Info Lab</p> <p>Duras est un écrivain que nous désignerons d'intimiste. Elle est intimiste lorsque son écriture met en scène vie et œuvre, tout à la fois ! Chez elle, ces deux mondes de l'écriture expriment le secret, le mystère et les sentiments les plus nuancés. Il y a là des événements historiques indélébiles qui l'ont profondément marquée. Dans ces deux mondes, l'intime ne se traduit que par les silences et les non-dits du discours. Ainsi, l'intime s'exprime lorsque l'auteur traduit l'intraduisible, c'est-à-dire, une histoire personnelle qui demeure dans son état latent. En effet, entre continuité et discontinuité du discours, l'intime trouve finalement son origine autour du manque et de l'absence. Pour les décrire, l'auteur met en lumière la musique. Elle symbolise le présent et le passé, la mémoire et l'oubli, l'amour et la mort, thèmes durassiens par excellence. Sans relier vie et œuvre, on constate que tous ces fantasmes de l'écriture sont directement liés à l'enfance de l'auteur. Ils sont précisément liés à la mort de son jeune frère. Cette histoire intime l'a marquée terriblement, jusqu'à la mort de l'auteur.</p>
LIT9	El cuento mexicano en el siglo XX	<p>When 5-7pm, Wed &amp; Fri, 19-28 July Where Sciences Center, Auditorium 2</p> <p>El objetivo de este curso es ofrecer una vista amplia a un número de textos y tendencias del cuento y el cine mexicano durante el siglo XX. El mismo ofrece un mapa analítico que presenta la exploración de los factores socio-históricos y literarios que informan la producción literaria de estos escritores. Se observarán sistemáticamente los elementos constitutivos del cuento clásico y moderno que ayudarán a aproximar una visión global del texto y que servirá como apoyo para su estudio y aproximación crítica. Entre algunos de los temas que serán abordados se encuentran: el surrealismo, criollismo, el realismo mágico y el relato a partir de 1950.</p>
LIT10	Representación animal en la narrativa centroamericana	<p>When 2-6pm, Tue, Mon &amp; Fri, 18, 24 &amp; 28 July Where Sciences Center, Auditorium 1</p> <p>Existe un espacio fronterizo donde se acaba el hombre y se termina uno por rendir incomodo al animal que reconocemos ser. Encontrar y situarse en ese territorio es una acción repetitiva y parte primordial de lo que somos. Posicionarnos en ese topos sin cronómetros, es pisar regiones mágicas donde la humanidad se nos disuelve para germinar en nuevos ímpetus de definición. Encontrarse de repente en el locus de la relación Hombre/animal —un tema por de más protagónico a lo largo de la historia— ofrece la posibilidad de revalorar conceptos clásicos. El trato de dicha relación dual desde ángulos semióticos, históricos, didácticos-morales-religiosos y hasta científicos es el legado en base al cual ha de articulase un abordaje que sopesa esas tradiciones bajo una búsqueda diferente. El presente curso pretende abordar de manera específica el terreno narrativo centroamericano del siglo XX y ya dentro de un marco posttestimonial y de posguerra. Los procesos de cambio que se generan invitan a reflexionar sobre el trasfondo teórico más reciente que nutre las nuevas tendencias y actitudes del discurso literario de la región. Las manifestaciones del pensar actual en Centro América parecen estar marcadas por un sarcasmo ostensible, por un constante sabotaje en contra de la manipulación destructiva y deletérea a la que está sometida la sociedad contemporánea víctima del silencio sistemático del statu quo. No obstante, encuentra en el locus de la representación animal —un tema por de más protagónico a lo largo de la historia— la posibilidad de revalorar conceptos clásicos. El trato del sujeto animal, es mi propuesta, invierte los valores discursivos institucionalizados de los sentidos, a la vez que propone reconsiderar el valor gradual que la jerarquía moral ofrece al humano en relación con el animal. Cada una de las sesiones se enfocarán en base a las siguientes pautas: 1<sup>a</sup> sesión. Historia intelectual y marcos teóricos; 2<sup>a</sup> sesión. Narrativa centroamericana del siglo XX hasta las guerras civiles y 3<sup>a</sup> sesión. Narrativa centroamericana de posguerra.</p>
LIT12	Estudios afrianos/diaspóricos y descolonización del imaginario	<p>When 8-12am, Mon-Fri, 3-14 July Where Sciences Center, Auditorium 1</p> <p>Este curso pretende mostrar cómo las producciones culturales (cine, literatura, music, etc.) africanas y de las diásporas africanas participan de la reconstrucción de las memorias fragmentadas, de las renegociaciones de las identidades asignadas, a través de la descolonización de los imaginarios. BIO1	Neurosciences: Theory & Applications	<p>When 2-6pm, Mon-Fri, 03-21 July Where Sciences Center, Auditorium 1, Pro-Reitoria</p> <p>Brief description The aim of this three-week course is to provide students with a general overview of the basic neurosciences with an emphasis on the sensory. The first week of the course will provide students with an introduction on evolutionary aspects of the nervous system and a historical perspective of different approaches used for the study of brain and behavior. It will also include a description on methods of quantification of brain functions and their motor consequences. The second week will focus on sensory systems. Students will understand some mechanisms underpinning sensory experiences. How the brain sees, hears and feels the physical stimuli provided by our external and internal world, as well as the resulting perceptual experiences for humans. The last week will be devoted to the high order cognitive functions as perception of action and emotion. The motor system will be analyzed as node of integration of different brain processes to generate the final outcome: voluntary movement.</p>
